Are you sure your school 's ICT network is ready for the summer holiday?

Consider what would happen if the loss of your school's or your organisation's main computer server systems prevented access to data resulting in the unavailability of administration services at the start of the term.

Likely causes:

- Fire (possibly just local to server facilities)
- Flood
- Theft
- Sabotage
- Power failure
- Telecommunication failure
- Software (Virus) Key staff (unforeseen) absence
