

Une peche and une banane are very similar to English just pronounced differently.


The 's' in French is silent.




une pomme








We recapped the five fruits from the last lesson and learnt how to name (with accurate pronunciation) and remember another five fruits in French.

We learnt how to say the ten fruits introduced in the previous two lessons in plural form.







une or un is for one fruit, les is for more than one.








We learnt how to express an opinion using the fruits we have learnt. We used the positive structure 'I like...'

J'aime les poires. 



J'aime les prunes.

J'aime means 'I like'. J'aime les bananes!

We have to use the plural (les) for the fruit when we say what we like.



We recapped on how to express an opinion using 'I like...'. We then used the negative structure 'I do not like...' to continue to express our opinions in French. We finished the lesson by asking our partner their opinion on a fruit in French using the question 'Est-ce que tu aimes...?'

Your partner will ask:
"Est-ce que tu aimes...?" 
plus a fruit in French.

You will answer with:
 "Oui, j'aime..." 
plus the fruit in French

or

 "Non, je n'aime pas..." 
plus the fruit in French.

We still need to remember to use the plural form when we say what we don't like.

Je n'aime pas means 'I do not like' in French.



Les fruits

phonics

sound in: **oi** • poire 

&

guttural 'r' The 'r' sound in French is guttural made from the back of the throat like in the words 'fraise', 'orange' and 'cerise'.

silent letters There are many last consonant silent letters in French. The final letter 's' is silent in the word 'les'. It will be pronounced almost like the 'leh' in English.

vocabulary

10 common fruit nouns with their determiner in French.



How to say the above fruits in both singular and plural form so I can say the fruits I like and those I do not like.

 **J'aime les pommes.**
I like apples

 **Je n'aime pas les pommes.**
I do not like apples.

grammar

Nouns in French can be masculine or feminine and singular or plural. This means that determiners can have different forms in French.

un **une**

Singular determiner 'a'

les

Plural determiner 'the'
