### **Match Report – St Neot v Furlanesend 21/04/16**

While it was quite a trek up to St Neot, our team did not seem fazed by this. Despite the 2-1 loss, it was a hard fought game which we were arguably unlucky to lose.

The first half began with St Neot putting themselves on the front foot; grabbing two goals in quick succession around 10 minutes in. This was despite some defiant defending from Harry, with Ruby putting in several dramatic headers which prevented further shots on our goal. Whilst Alfie worked industriously to break through their lines, it was to no avail.

Then, I believe, was a moment which none of those at the game will forget too soon. It wasn't a Ronaldo style free kick yet it matches it in the emotions it spurred. Jude did an incredibly strong throw which ended up in St Neot's penalty area. The keeper then struggled to handle the ball Jude threw in, probably due to the power of the throw; subsequently ensuring the ball fell over the line. Nathan was key in starting many of these attacks; battling well to win the ball back and launching it up field where Alfie, Louie, Peter and Brae were ready to take on the defence:

Regrettably, we couldn't break through their lines after some astute defending from St Neot. It was a valiant effort nonetheless and I would hope the team is proud of their performance. The team can really take heart from this and I'm sure we will anticipate their next game after their efforts today!!!
